Dear Majority Leader Thune, Minority Leader Schumer, Speaker Johnson, and Leader Jeffries,

We write to urge you to strike the Budget Reconciliation provision that would put a moratorium on the enforcement of state artificial intelligence (AI) legislation for the next ten years. The provision, which has faced widespread backlash from state legislatures and Attorneys General, civil society, and the public, was greenlit by the parliamentarian after being rewritten to be tied to broadband funding. As it stands, this provision would wipe out virtually all existing and future state AI laws, giving AI companies exactly what they want: no rules, no accountability, and total control. As organizations working on the frontline of the consequences of AI development with no guardrails, we know what this would mean for our children.

As written, the provision is so broad it would block states from enacting and enforcing any AI-specific protections, including measures addressing hyper-sexualized AI companions, social media recommendation algorithms, protections for whistleblowers, and more. The exceptions written into the draft only cover laws that are "generally applicable" or "narrowly tailored" to streamlining AI development, a combination that would enable only a small fraction, if any, of proposed and enacted state laws to survive and continue to block any AI-specific safety measures. It ties lawmakers' hands for a decade, sidelining policymakers and leaving families on their own as they face risks and harms that emerge with this fast-evolving technology in the years to come.

Despite amendments made limiting moratorium compliance to the new funding, as written, NTIA retains broad authority to de-obligate initial BEAD allocations should a state accepting any funds from the \$500 million tranche not comply with the moratorium. For a decade, the vague definitions of what technologies are covered could create a chilling effect as states seek to remain in compliance with the provision, discouraging action on broader technology issues out of fear that it would lead to a de-obligation of existing BEAD funds.

Historically, states have served as the laboratories of democracy, tailoring guardrails and protections to their residents' unique needs. A blanket moratorium on the enforcement of state legislation would upend well-established principles of federalism. States are well-positioned to adapt to the rapid speed of AI development with protections that their consumers need while allowing for innovation to flourish.

In just the last few years we have seen AI drive an explosion of deep fake pornography in our communities, draw children into toxic relationships with AI companions, and super-charge the recommendation algorithms driving a generational mental health crisis. Just last year 15% of high school students — representing millions of kids — reported knowing a classmate who had been victimized by AI-generated image based sexual abuse. AI companion applications are pushing sexual content on children and encouraging them to self-harm. Recent reports have found that industry efforts to protect children on AI companion applications are easily circumvented. AI-driven content recommendation systems are feeding videos about eating disorders and self-harm to users.

AI offers great benefits for work, education, science, the economy and so much more, but it cannot be denied that we are already seeing an explosion of online harms - not just to kids, but for scammers targeting the elderly, deep fakes targeting creators, etc. The last decade of social media has shown us what happens when we wait to act on new technologies. We, the undersigned organizations, call on you to vote to strike the moratorium on the enforcement of AI regulation in the budget reconciliation text. It is irresponsible and short sighted to tie the hands of state legislators in the face of federal inaction.
